

Years ago, deep in the Okanagan, over a campfire conversation, Jennifer said: "There are plenty of songs about miners and farmers and civil rights activists, but where are the ballads to the people who get budgets in on time? What about the people who work behind the scenes, to help us reach policy decisions that have the power to make everyone happier, smarter, kinder or healthier?" And so the seed was planted.

We all headed to Ottawa to interview public servants. They were eager to share their experiences, though many seemed perplexed and at times even suspicious by our interest in their life's work. With copious notes and hours of recordings, we gathered in a derelict government office on Sparks Street and the ferocious process of creation and decision-making began. We played and fought, listened and improvised, we talked in circles – sometimes spending hours exploring an idea only to produce one usable

anecdote or insight. Many of our best ideas happened off the clock. Propositions were made and forgotten, then rediscovered and applied. No decision was ever made without the consent of all creators. It was infuriating and illuminating, but we continued to sing through our discordant ideas.

A motif emerged: "How can one execute meaningful work within a bureaucracy without the support and trust of the people one is striving to serve?" What do we want from our public servants? Some say it is to fearlessly advise and loyally implement, but what happens when that advice is not heard?

It is because of the support of Common Boots Theatre, consulting artists, technicians, stage managers, artistic directors, board members, granting bodies and private donors—all of those who believed in this project before it had a voice—that we are here tonight performing for you.

Thank you for coming to hear our song.

OUTDOOR WINTER THEATRE

Winter Theatre December 2016 - Toronto, Ont. /Armstrong, B.C.

Each December, Common Boots Theatre produces an outdoor processional play at Toronto's Evergreen Brick Works. The audience follows the action on foot across the historic site. A choir serenades with seasonal music as actors perform the story. Now in its 5th year, the outdoor winter show has become a unique holiday tradition for families from all corners of the GTA.



Playwright George F. Walker has written the 2016 outdoor winter show as a co-commission with B.C's Caravan Farm Theatre. Inspired by Evergreen Brick Works and the winter tradition, Walker's *The Orphan's Dream* follows two best friends who journey through a time tunnel looking to discover why they were abandoned and where they came from. How far back in time do they have to go to find the real answers to these questions? Do any of the people who they come across know. Does the Woman in the horse cart? Does the Hermit? Does Scrooge? Do the Magician and his Apprentice know? Do the Knights in very shiny armor? Or maybe even the Caveman or the DINOSAUR?

COMMON BOOTS THEATRE (formerly Theatre Columbus)



Common Boots Theatre is one of over 250 professional performing arts organizations in the city of Toronto. It is part of a vibrant group of independent theatres that create collaboratively-devised theatre for specific spaces, and one of only a few whose works feature women as central characters and use humour as a primary dramaturgical agent.

Common Boots Theatre's mandate is to create, through a collaborative process, new and original Canadian plays that combine a physical theatre tradition with social and personal issues relevant to our time and place.

Our annual activities include an outdoor winter production, the premier of a new work for the mainstage, and the commissioning and development of up to three new works. We have experimented with audio plays for podcast and aim to include these as a regular creative platform. We connect with the greater community and support professional artists through workshops and special performances.

We create original works that explore the connections between the individual and society, examining and transforming the ties that bind us — our ideas, our fables, our morals and our environment.

Our collaborative work emphasizes the virtuosity of the performing artist with inventive staging and scripted stories. The process evolves organically, through facilitated improvisation.

The space and environment for each production is unique and integral to the art – a winter evening, a proscenium, a warehouse, a black box, or the airwaves.

Built, broken, recreated and refined in the process of performance itself, the resulting play is a living organism that adapts to its surroundings over time. The published play offers a polished spontaneity.

We are driven to show off this country's unbelievable theatrical talent to the public; and to be part of those theatrical events that show off the best of what we are as a community. We are committed to the next generation of theatre artists by providing opportunities to create and develop alongside us, challenging our work to be better and stronger than before. We encourage the voice of women in artistic leadership.
