


Beckett has an extraordinary sense of humour. It's often Beckett has an once of the low dark humour, but it is inspired from his love of the low comedy charm and skills of Charlie Chaplin and Buster Keaton. There is much to be found of these silent film stars in Happy Days. The characters' names are Winnie and Willie. (Willy-nilly? A dancing vaudeville team? The countless innuendos of their names.) Winnie has the clown's dilemma: she cannot leave the stage.

Beckett's plays are unlike any others and defv comparison. He does not place his characters in a historical or recognizable setting. They exist in an unfamiliar place: an essential environment that has no decoration or familiar landmarks. All that is inessential is stripped away so that the play is like an event happening in a theatre in front of an audience. An audience is always more or less aware that they are in a theatre and Beckett doesn't conceal but confronts this by weaving it into the fabric of the play. Perhaps this is to compel the audience to generate the "meaning" of the play.

"I want neither to instruct nor to improve nor to keep people from getting bored. I want to bring poetry into drama, a poetry which has been through the void and makes a new start in a new room-space... There are no easy




Barbara Budd - Moderator

Beckett on Film

May 19 - 22, 2010 10:00pm

In 1991, Michael Colgan, artistic director of the Gate Theatre in Dublin, produced a Beckett Festival all nineteen of Beckett's stage plays (minus Eleuthéria), performed to rave reviews and then imported to London and New York. During this time he began to consider the idea of turning all of the plays into films. Eventually connecting with filmmaker Alan Moloney, the "Beckett on Film Project" was finally realized 2000-2001: nineteen films by nineteen different directors, each charged with adapting their play to the demands of film while adhering to Beckett's



careful directions. Partially funded by RTÉ and Channel 4, the project called upon a wealth of talent from all creative spheres - theatre, film, television, acting, and even music. The final result is quite an achievement, and represents a significant addition to the field of Beckett performance.

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Director's Notes

Theatre Columbus is dedicated to physical theatre. All that Fall is a radio play. Seems like a perfect match.

Beckett wrote "Never thought about radio play technique but in the dead of t'other night got a nice gruesome idea full of cartwheels and dragging of feet and puffing and panting which may or may not lead to something."

So we thought we'd try it, by putting on staged reading.

The Beckett estate but stipulated that under no circumstances could it be performed in front of an audience. It was meant to be heard, Beckett (and his estate) said, not watched.

Okay, we thought. We'll all sit together, actors and audience, but we won't turn on the light. We'll sit in the dark — with a candle or two — and we'll share some wine or beer, and we'll listen to a story about an old women who walks to the train station to meet her husband as a birthday surprise.

Just like Irish (and Canadian) audiences did in the old days: family gathered around the warm glow of the radio, lights off for ambience or to save money, the warmth of the cook stove (okay, not everything)... and we'll listen.



Samuel Barclay Beckett was born at Cooldrinach in Foxrock, County Dublin, on 13 April 1906. Beckett, excelled in modern languages and athletics. He enjoyed the vibrant theatre scene of post-independence Dublin. Moreover, he had the opportunity to watch American films and discover the silent comedies of Buster Keaton and Charlie Chaplin that would

crucially influence his interest in tramps.

Beckett traveled to Paris where he first met the fellow Dubliner who would become a important influence and close friend, James Joyce. Beckett assisted Joyce in the construction of Finnegans Wake, but also began writing himself, inspired by the vibrant Parisian literary circle. In 1930, he published his first poem, Whoroscope, winning a reward of ten pounds in a poetry competition. Shortly after, he published his brief but groundbreaking "Proust," a study of the recently deceased author whom Beckett admired so much. He returned to Dublin later that year and wrote a book of short stories called More Pricks Than Kicks (1934).

He wrote his first novel in Paris in 1932, Dream of Fair to Middling Women, that was highly autobiographical, a powerful indication that Beckett was emerging from Joyce's shadow and developing his own voice. He went back to Dublin and then moved temporarily to London where he worked on much of his next novel, Murphy. He moved continuously for the next few years before settling permanently in Paris in 1937.

When the German occupation began, Beckett joined the resistance. He became active in the localized intelligence network known as "Gloria," and his group was awarded the Croix de Guerre in 1945. The Siege in the Room, as Beckett characterized it, occurred in the years 1946-50, when his focus shifted to ideas of the essential, the minimal, the unadorned. French became his written language, and the problem of expressing -expressing anything -- became central to his aesthetic. His trilogy of novels - Molloy (1951), Malone Dies (1951), and The Unnamable (1953), was written at an altogether extraordinary pace in French and later translated into English.

When Waiting for Godot appeared on the stage in Paris in 1953, the world of theatre was startled to find itself changed. The plays which followed - Endgame (1958), Happy Days (1961), and Play (1963) - similarly used abstraction as a means to explore the most powerful themes, and to question whether the themes have any value or meaning. Beckett returned to Dublin in 1959 to receive an honorary doctorate from Trinity College. Two years later he won, with Jorge Luis Borges, the Prix International des Editeurs; and in 1969 he was awarded the Nobel Prize for

Samuel Beckett died December 22, 1989, in Paris, France.


